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Remember to renew your Senior Centre membership. All yearly memberships are due on January 1st.

When you join the Centre, bring in a buddy or spouse and have your two memberships reduced from \$30.00 to \$25.00.

Life Membership fee is \$150.00. Yearly membership fee is \$15.00. Membership entitles you to: a) vote at General, Special or Annual Meetings of the Centre: b) be elected to the Board of Directors; c) Be eligible to receive a special membership rate for programs or events at the Centre; d) Receive a monthly phone call, if desired, informing you of upcoming Centre activities.
